Introduction

“Leave no one behind,” is the ethos of the Moore-Miller Administration and remains the central thread in the State’s efforts to design, build, and sustain partnerships with dozens of leading philanthropies, community organizations, and private businesses.

This commitment to collaboration was formalized in May 2023, when Governor Moore signed an executive order (EO) establishing the Maryland Council on Innovation and Impact (“the Council”) to deepen partnerships with social sector organizations, including philanthropies, for-profit companies, and nonprofit organizations. Cross-sector partnerships unite the best of the public and private sectors and harness their collective resources to achieve greater impact by driving innovation, strengthening communities, and ensuring all Marylanders have the opportunity to thrive.¹

This document represents Maryland’s three-year (2023-2025) retrospective report from the Council on Innovation & Impact, examining the administration’s first several years of public-private partnership work. The report provides an overview of the Council’s priorities, the impact of key cross-sector partnerships to date, and a list of example partnerships launched during the Moore-Miller Administration.

Council on Innovation & Impact: Priorities & Strategies

The Council on Innovation and Impact convenes local and national social sector leaders alongside Maryland agency heads to develop and advance collaborative solutions across sectors. Chaired by Jonny Dorsey, Senior Advisor to the Governor, the Council works at the intersection of government, philanthropy, and the private sector to drive measurable impact for Marylanders.

Strategic Priorities

The Council focuses on four interconnected priorities:

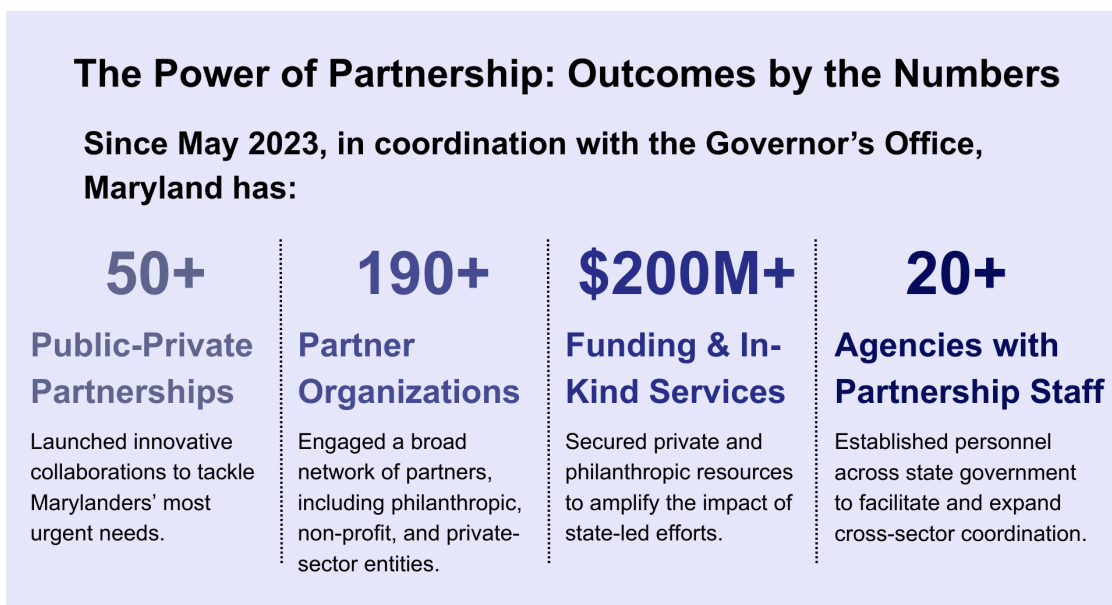
- **Leveraging Social Sector Expertise:** Aligning the resources and capabilities of innovative organizations with state efforts to address Maryland’s most pressing challenges.
- **Advancing Evidence-Based Practice:** Integrating rigorous evidence into the state’s innovation work, measuring outcomes systematically, and contributing to the nation’s broader knowledge base.
- **Strengthening Cross-Sector Partnerships:** Creating pathways for innovation, talent, and resources to flow between the social and government sectors.
- **Driving Strategic Innovation:** Surfacing transformative ideas and policy options that build enduring partnerships and accelerate community-level impact statewide.

How the Council Works

The Council translates these priorities into action through four core strategies:

- **Convening Stakeholders:** Bringing together nonprofits, businesses, and state agencies to identify high-impact partnership opportunities.
- **Building Strategic Partnerships:** Cultivating relationships with foundations, corporate partners, and community organizations, and connecting them with leaders across Maryland government.
- **Facilitating Knowledge Exchange:** Creating forums where sectors share best practices, emerging innovations, and lessons learned.
- **Mobilizing Resources:** Connecting state priorities with philanthropic funding, volunteer talent, and specialized expertise from across sectors.

Partnerships By-the-Numbers



Maryland is setting the national standard for cross-sector collaboration. Strategic partnerships enable the state to test, refine, and scale innovative solutions with real-world implementation—transforming how government addresses complex challenges.

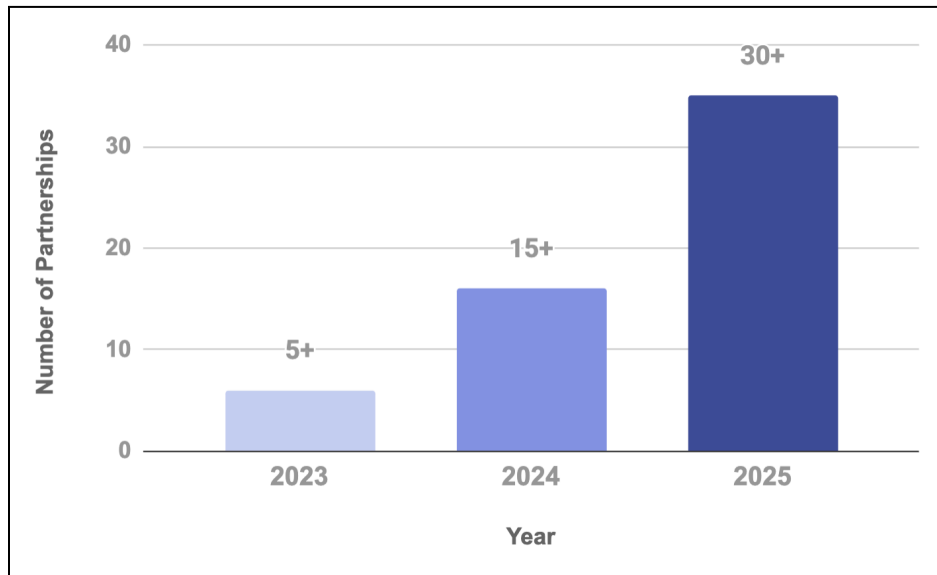
Since the start of the Moore-Miller Administration, Maryland has launched groundbreaking partnerships across critical issue areas, including benefits and healthcare access, youth gun violence prevention, and closing education gaps. These collaborations deliver measurable results by combining government resources with philanthropic capital, community expertise, and evidence-based approaches.

Many of these initiatives were developed in partnership with Council-represented organizations—including the Aaron Straus and Lillie Straus Foundation, Annie E. Casey Foundation, Bainum Family Foundation, Goldseker Foundation, and Harry and Jeanette Weinberg Foundation. Their leadership sets the example for catalytic investments that bridge sectors and accelerate impact.

Through partnerships, Maryland is tackling its most persistent challenges more effectively and innovatively—advancing the Administration's vision of making Maryland the best place in the world to change the world.

Maryland's partnerships are growing exponentially. The number of active cross-sector partnerships has expanded dramatically—from a handful in 2023 to more than 15 in 2024 and over 30 in 2025 (Figure 1). This rapid acceleration reflects the Administration's deliberate commitment to partnership-driven governance and signals growing confidence among philanthropic and community partners in Maryland's collaborative approach.

Why Partner with Government? Lessons from Maryland's Cross-Sector Collaborations

The State of Maryland's work in its first three years of Governor Moore's term demonstrates how government partnerships can amplify impact for philanthropies and nonprofits while strengthening state capacity to deliver results. Three key advantages emerge:

1. Achieve unprecedented scale and sustainability. Government partnerships offer a multiplier effect that standalone programs cannot match. When philanthropies and nonprofits invest in state capacity—whether through AI deployment, benefits modernization, or evidence-based programs—their resources unlock matching public dollars, infrastructure, and reach. Maryland's partnerships consistently demonstrate greater leverage ratios, with seed funding catalyzing state investment. Successful pilots become embedded in government operations, ensuring solutions reach hundreds of thousands of residents and continue beyond initial grant periods. For nonprofits, government partnerships provide access to resources, data, and distribution channels that dramatically extend programmatic impact.

2. Build proof points that shape national policy and practice. Partnering with state government doesn't just solve local problems—it creates replicable models that influence policy nationwide. Maryland's innovations in AI governance, federal workforce transitions, and multi-agency coordination are actively being adopted by other jurisdictions. Work for America's Maryland pilot was followed by expansions to Akron, Allentown, and Kansas City, extending impact to tens of thousands more workers. When organizations co-design solutions with government, they're building the evidence base and operational blueprints that drive systemic change across states and at the federal level—positioning their work as a national model.

3. Transform how government delivers on shared missions. Government partnerships enable organizations to do more than deliver services or fund programs—they create fundamental improvements in how states serve communities. By providing flexible capital, technical expertise, and innovation capacity that government often lacks, partners help agencies become more responsive, efficient, and equitable. Maryland's benefits modernization saved applicants over 1,180 hours in a single pilot; its AI chatbot improved access to \$72.5 million in summer nutrition benefits. These partnerships prove that when the social sector invests in government capacity, all parties achieve their missions more effectively, with innovations and efficiencies that compound over time.

Partnership Case Studies

The following case studies highlight several impactful partnerships maximizing public and private sector resources that innovatively respond to community needs.



State Service Delivery: Transforming Government with Artificial Intelligence (AI)



Overview: With investment from [The Rockefeller Foundation](#), Maryland launched two pioneering collaborations with [Anthropic](#) and [Percepta](#) — serving as implementing partners providing in-kind services — to responsibly deploy artificial intelligence across state government. These partnerships advance the Moore-Miller Administration's commitment to modernizing service delivery while improving outcomes for Maryland families and increasing government efficiency.

Anthropic Partnership: Maryland is equipping AI power users across state agencies with Claude AI and hands-on technical support to design and deploy solutions that reduce child poverty and advance economic mobility — improving benefits access, strengthening service coordination, and enhancing responsiveness to resident needs while prioritizing responsible and secure AI use.

Percepta Partnership: Percepta is embedding engineering talent within the Maryland Department of the Environment to build AI tools that modernize permitting processes

critical to housing and infrastructure development — expanding the state's capacity to deliver faster, more efficient approvals.³



Key Partners: The Rockefeller Foundation, Anthropic, and Percepta



Progress to Date: This new phase of partnership will build on existing efforts to make Maryland government more effective and responsive to communities' needs. Together, the State of Maryland, Anthropic, and Percepta have already begun serving Marylanders in the following ways by:

- **Expanding benefits access (2025):** A bilingual AI chatbot powered by Anthropic's Claude Sonnet model helped expand customer access and reduce call volumes, enabling the State to distribute more than \$72.5 million worth of SUN Bucks – a program that provides food for students during summer break – to over 600,000 Maryland youth. This partnership helped Maryland make its largest ever investment to fight summer childhood hunger in state history.⁴
- **Building projects faster (2025):** Percepta Engineers, the Department of the Environment, and the Department of Information Technology developed a self-service portal for environmental site investments to more quickly develop and finance building projects. The portal can make it easier for organizations to efficiently and transparently invest in Maryland's future.⁵



Governor Moore's Call to Action: Reducing Child Poverty



Overview: To tackle concentrated childhood poverty, Maryland launched the [ENOUGH Initiative](#) (Engaging Neighborhoods, Organizations, Unions, Governments, and Households) in 2024⁶ —a place-based, community-driven approach to reduce child poverty and increase economic mobility for nearly 150,000 children across the state.⁷ The Initiative funds 28 grantees throughout Maryland with approximately \$37 million in ENOUGH grants. Grantees have also secured an additional \$23 million from nine state agencies in FY25, demonstrating strong cross-agency alignment.⁸

In 2025, philanthropic partners created the ENOUGH Community Support Fund (ECSF), a pooled fund providing flexible resources to state-funded grantees working to reduce child poverty. Local and national philanthropies provided seed funding to launch the initiative, equipping community leaders to address ENOUGH's four core pillars: high-quality childcare and education, healthy families, economically secure families, and safe and thriving communities.⁹

The ENOUGH Alliance—a coalition of local and national philanthropy and private sector organizations—supports the ECSF and provides aligned funding to organizations advancing ENOUGH priorities in target communities through 2030. Alliance investments are designed to amplify state resources and accelerate measurable progress in reducing child poverty.¹⁰



Key Partners: ENOUGH Community Support Fund, the ENOUGH Alliance, and ENOUGH grantees



Progress to Date: Together, the ENOUGH Community Support Fund and ENOUGH Alliance have mobilized over \$100 million in private funding and resources to combat poverty and advance economic mobility across Maryland. Illustrative investments by ENOUGH Alliance members include:

- **Latin American Youth Center (LAYC) — Prince George's County:** LAYC plans to serve more than 2,000 youth, adults, and families in Prince George's County this year through the ENOUGH Initiative, delivering tutoring and after-school programming that supports students from elementary through high school in building literacy, accessing college, and developing career readiness. An ECSF investment is enabling LAYC to expand into new schools—leveraging proven best practices—with a goal of growing the reach of its services by 10%.
- **Park Heights Renaissance — Baltimore City:** Park Heights Renaissance is driving community-led revitalization in Baltimore's Park Heights neighborhood, identifying affordable housing as a top priority for local families. A Weinberg Foundation commitment of \$3.7 million—made in direct response to Park Heights Renaissance's community priorities—will support the creation of approximately 160 affordable rental units, including 13 permanent supportive housing units and seven units for individuals with disabilities, over the coming years.



Maryland's Digital Experience: Innovating Tax Returns & Benefits Access



Overview: With support from [Blue Meridian Partners](#) and other funders, Maryland partnered with [Code for America \(CFA\)](#) in 2023 to transform how the state delivers safety net benefits. Through CFA's Safety Net Innovation Lab, Maryland is reimagining access to critical programs including SNAP, WIC, Medicaid, and other

vital services. In 2024, CFA's partnership with the state expanded with the launch of FileYourStateTaxes, a free tax filing tool that helped Marylanders more easily claim tax refunds and credits.



Key Partners: Code for America and Blue Meridian Partners



Progress to Date: These partnerships have delivered tangible results for Maryland families:

- **SNAP and Cash Assistance Pilot (2024):** CFA designed and executed a three-month pilot that tested improvements to the state's online application process. Over 1,300 Marylanders across two counties participated in the pilot to apply for food, cash, and energy assistance, with applications taking less than 20 minutes each—saving applicants a combined 1,180 hours.¹⁵
- **FileYourStateTaxes (2024):** This [free platform](#) enabled 6,280 eligible Maryland taxpayers to prepare and file their taxes electronically during the 2025 tax season, saving the average filer \$270 in service costs.¹⁴ The State also hosted multiple webinars on key tax credits like the Earned Income Tax Credit and Child Tax Credit to help Marylanders maximize refunds and reduce tax liability.
- **Maryland Benefits One Application (2025):** CFA leveraged insights from the aforementioned pilot program to provide essential support to Maryland on the design of One Application. This single application allows over 1.3 million Maryland residents to apply for five vital benefits—Medicaid, SNAP, Temporary Assistance for Needy Families, energy assistance, and WIC—in under 30 minutes. CFA assisted with the design of this mobile-friendly tool, including user research, design review, user testing, and language access improvements. As of January 2026, more than 283,000 Marylanders have used the One Application.



Public-Sector Talent: Supporting Federal Workers



Overview: Maryland is home to over 200,000 federal workers, and roughly 25,000 were affected by 2025 federal layoffs. To support displaced employees, the State partnered with [Work for America](#) to connect experienced public servants with state and local government career opportunities through [Civic Match](#), Work for America's talent-matching and recruitment platform. Maryland is the first Work for America

“Spotlight State,” positioning the state as a premier destination for vetted candidates to continue their careers in public service.¹⁶

This partnership complements broader efforts by the Moore-Miller Administration to assist federal workers. Across agencies, the state is offering a range of supports, including highlighting nearly 130,000 job openings in high-demand industries through Live Work Maryland Job Search, connecting federal employees to second careers in public education via a partnership with Teach.org, and providing veteran-specific resources for the approximately 15% of federal workers who are also veterans.¹⁷



Key Partners: Work for America



Progress to Date: Shifts in federal recruitment, staffing, and retention are reshaping the workforce nationwide, and the impact on Maryland is acute. In response, the state’s partnership with Work for America has delivered tangible results:

- **Connections to state and local job opportunities (2025):** Through Civic Match more than 2,000 candidates sought opportunities in Maryland, many with more than a decade of civil service experience. Through the platform, job seekers connected with hiring managers across health, labor, housing and community development, commerce, and environmental departments.¹⁸
- **Virtual and in-person career fairs (2025):** In April 2025, Work for America facilitated matches for federal professionals with state and local government jobs. Job seekers accessed real-time career development resources from over two dozen organizations, including resume support, unemployment benefits guidance, and career coaching. By May 2025, several participants had already received interview invitations and contingent job offers.¹⁹

Through this partnership, Maryland continues to provide displaced federal workers with high-quality opportunities to maintain their public service careers while strengthening the state’s workforce across critical sectors.



The Maryland Partnership for Proven Programs: Improving Cradle-to-Career Outcomes



Overview: In 2024, Maryland partnered with [Arnold Ventures](#) to offer up to \$20 million in matching funds to state and local government agencies. This initiative aims to scale evidence-based programs in workforce training, education, and crime prevention—ultimately improving outcomes for Marylanders from childhood through

career. The nonpartisan [Coalition for Evidence-Based Policy](#) is supporting this effort by helping identify promising programs, guide their implementation and expansion, and build sustainable public funding.



Key Partners: Arnold Ventures and the Coalition for Evidence-Based Policy.



Progress to Date: The Partnership for Proven Programs has awarded \$40 million in combined state and philanthropic funding to evidence-based programs supporting Maryland youth, including:

- **ASSISTments (2024):** An online math platform providing instant, standards-aligned learning reports to support formative assessment and practice. Initially serving middle schools in Baltimore County and Charles County, it expanded in 2025-2026 to Prince George's County and an Eastern Shore cluster (Wicomico, Worcester, and Somerset Counties), with educator coaching for effective implementation. ASSISTments is shown to increase math achievement by 30-60% of a grade level over two years.
- **Saga Education (2024):** High-impact, small-group math tutoring addressing achievement gaps among high school students. Launched in Baltimore City Public Schools, it expanded in 2025-2026 to over 10 Baltimore City high schools and 4 Prince George's County high schools, focusing on Algebra 1 intervention. Over three years, Saga Education accelerates math achievement by the equivalent of 70–90% of an additional grade level.
- **Accelerated Study in Associate Programs (ASAP) at Community Colleges (2025):** Harford, Prince George's, Wor-Wic, and Baltimore County Community Colleges are adopting the ASAP model, providing low-income students with comprehensive academic, personal, and financial support to reduce barriers to graduation and accelerate degree completion. ASAP has been shown to increase college graduation rates by 11-15 percentage points.
- **Big Brothers Big Sisters (2025):** Expanding community-based mentoring for 1,000 youth—particularly young men—to address mental health, substance use, and violence prevention across nine Maryland counties. This program has been found to reduce youth delinquent behavior and substance use by 20-40% over four years.

2026 Priorities & Opportunities

Partnerships help unlock Maryland's full potential. Through strategic collaboration, the Moore-Miller Administration has made measurable progress on reducing child poverty, connecting Marylanders to careers, and improving student outcomes — demonstrating a proven model that leverages the agility of the social sector alongside the scale of government to turn bold visions into lived realities for Maryland families.

In 2026 and beyond, Maryland will deepen and expand partnerships across four strategic priorities:

- **Reducing Child Poverty and Expanding Economic Mobility.** Building on the ENOUGH Initiative — the nation's first statewide, place-based poverty strategy — Maryland seeks partners to open new pathways to economic security for youth and families through flexible funding, wraparound services, and evidence-based interventions.
- **Responsibly Leveraging AI to Modernize Service Delivery.** Maryland will continue deploying AI to empower state employees and accelerate solutions to residents' most pressing challenges — expanding housing development, connecting people to benefits, and building a more responsive social safety net. Partners can help scale AI innovations, provide technical expertise, and ensure responsible, equity-centered implementation.
- **Recruiting and Retaining Public Sector Talent.** Maryland is transforming how government attracts, develops, and supports its workforce. Partners can help recruit top talent, provide training opportunities, and modernize operations so government can deliver faster, smarter, and more responsive services.
- **Expanding Service Pathways with the Department of Service and Civic Innovation.** Partnerships will create more opportunities for Marylanders to serve their communities, access pathways into good jobs and public service careers, and build bridges across divides.

Conclusion

Maryland is proving that strategic partnerships are essential infrastructure for modern governance. Through intentional collaboration with philanthropies, businesses, and nonprofits, the state is modernizing service delivery, scaling evidence-based solutions, and expanding what's possible with public resources. By aligning philanthropic capital with government scale and innovation with implementation, Maryland demonstrates that partnerships aren't just helpful — they're how states meet today's challenges while building capacity for tomorrow's.
